Abstract:

China's elite politics is undergoing substantial change. As the CCP is being transformed from a revolutionary party to a government party, its elite politics is being transformed from being based on strongmen control to a mixture of personalized process (informal politics) and deepening institutionalization. The dynamics is best reflected by each round of generational transfer of power. A party national congress magnifies its effect. This talk uses the personnel arrangement of the 17th Party Congress as a case study to analyze the Party's imperatives to deepen institutionalization of power but its continued dependence on informal politics for elite interaction.
