Abstract:

Xinjiang is the north-westernmost province-level unit in China. The population is multiethnic, the largest

single ethnic group being the Uygurs, who are Turkic in culture

and Muslim by religion.

In July 2009 there was serious ethnic rioting in Urumqi, the capital of Xinjiang, with significant casualties. There have been several incidents since then, most notably in Hotan and Kashgar in

July 2011.

The paper will look briefly at the internal and external causes of these disturbances and it will consider the effects and implications of the riots and later disturbances. It will also make some comparisons with the situation in Tibet. Some comparisons and contrasts will be made between the diaspora leaders of both ethnic groups, especially the internationally famous Tibetan Dalai Lama and the President of the World Uyghur Congress Rebiya Kadeer.
